Historical objects of Territorial Headquarters



Archives is home to a large collection of Salvation Army First Day Covers and stamps from around the world. Sometimes there is no great value in the stamps themselves but the value is in what they are actually attached to - not in the monetary sense but the history that goes with it. Commissioner Earnest Elliot was an enthusiastic stamp collector and we have him to thank for a large part of the collection.


POSTAL WEIGHING SCALES FROM THE THQ POSTAL DEPARTMENT Avery weighing scales from the THQ Postal Department, these were used to weigh the letters and parcels before being forwarded to the Post Office in Wellington. W & T Avery Ltd. was a British manufacturer of weighing machines. The company was founded in the early 18th century and took the name W & T Avery in 1818.

CORONA TYPEWRITER 1917 Corona typewriter from the original Territorial Headquarters on the corner of Taranaki Street & Dixon Street. For years, the tiny Tompkins County town of Groton New York where they were produced was the

starting point of some of the greatest books and stories ever written. Hemmingway was a well known user of the Corona. In the early-20th century, Corona typewriters, the Number 3 in particular, dominated press tents around the world. They were inexpensive, lightweight and portable, the first typewriter to fold into itself and fit into an easy-to-carry case.

During 2017 a quantity of historic (pre1900) cabinet photographs were processed into the Heritage Centre & Archives collection. One photograph stood out - a group of early Salvationists. Some of the eight people were immediately recognised. So began an investigation

into who were the other Salvationists? And where, when and why was the photograph taken? Other facts were quickly noted. The photograph was taken in Masterton by Thomas E Price. Captain Alfred Wilkinson in the back right was recognised as was early



Maori convert Hohepa Huria (Maori Joe). The first piece of research located Captain Wilkinson's officer service record which showed that he was corps officer in Masterton from 13 September 1886 to 15 February 1887.



New Zealand Home League Badge

The War Cry showed that Hohepa Huria had been part of a tour party that included a visit to Masterton at the beginning of 1887. A further search of The War Cry in relation to this tour showed that the tour party visited Wellington City Corps, Masterton Corps, Blenheim Corps and Nelson Corps.

Because the tour party were in Masterton 3-4 January 1887, this gives an almost precise date for when the photo was taken.

The lady with the baby and the gentleman behind her were identified as Major & Mrs Barritt. Major

Barritt had taken over command of the New Zealand Division when Pollard was appointed to Australia in 1885. Barritt was still in command at the time of this photograph. The daughter was born 1886.

The tallest person in the back row was identified as Staff Officer Fisher - he was known to be a tall man. Photographs, including some in The War Cry, confirm this was him.
