The first Salvation Army Congress held in New Zealand occured in Dunedin for a few days from Christmas Day 1883. The Salvationists assembled at Moray Place at 10am Christmas morning before a grand march around various streets of Dunedin. The photograph taken at the Congress (right) was taken on the Friday while events were held in and around the Caledonian Pavilion (Kensington). This was just the beginning of a tradition of congresses in New Zealand over the decades. And while there were congresses all around the world there were occassionally International

congresses and many New Zealand Salvationists attended these. A feature of past congresses was the participation of many corps groups. Following are photographs from many of the New Zealand congresses.
